Even more fun!!

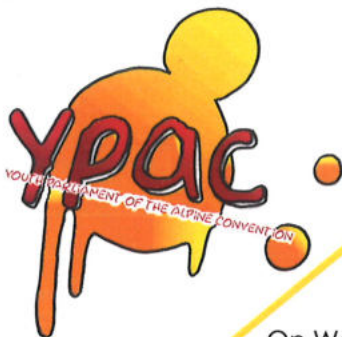


Preparation of the General Assembly

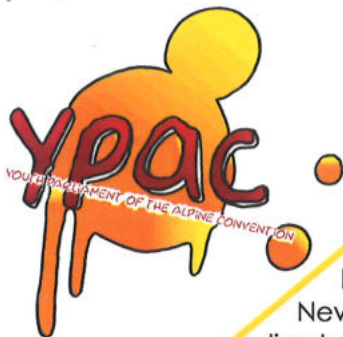
A Labyrinth called FOS

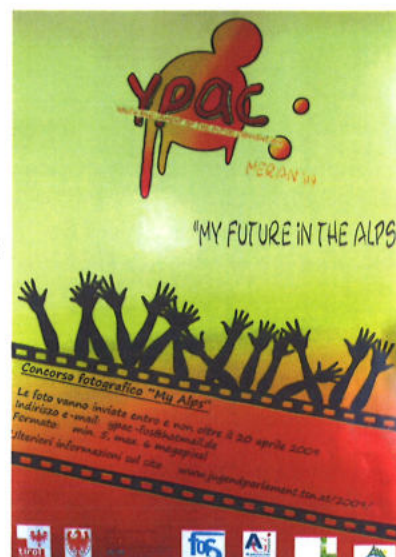
We strayed a bit and then finally found a bigger staircase, which led us into the kitchen. I was so relieved! And fortunately my fears of starving didn't come true.

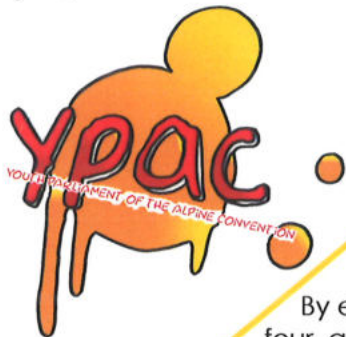

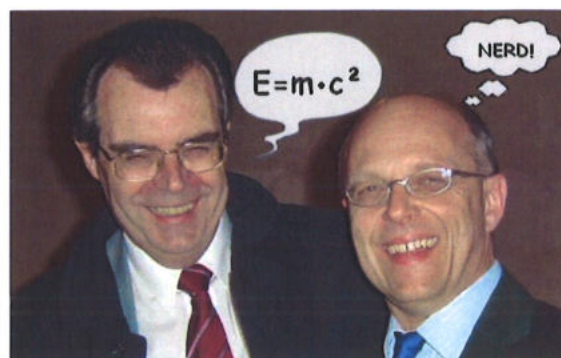

„I think I'm a man“ Denise Nyffenegger

After having fed our hungry mouths with delicious pizza, a discussion with the journalist, Georg Schedereit, was following. The topic was "boarders" because of that we watched two films. Strange statements ("I'm not a hen") and funny people (there was a half-naked gardener with a garden hose) in the film made the German-speaking people laugh. The Italians, Frenchs and Slovenes didn't understand a word because everything was in German.
