Committees

COMMITTEE 1 - THE BALANCED GUYS:

Ending his speech, Mr Lederer seemed to be very happy that the strict timetable didn't allow further discussion;—) During the Discussion we felt a cool atmosphere between the participants and were afraid that it will last the whole Team-Building Workshop.
